donkeys carrying a load of books the books won't change them they can carry the holiest books but will still be donkeys among the practices frager teaches are zikr or remembrance of god through chanting halvet or spiritual retreat and adab or right action thus do we develop character or rather restore the character we had at birth i've never seen a baby with a bad character he says we are all born in a pure state with hard work and god's blessings we can return to it other topics include obstacles on the path reducing narcissism inner work prayer marriage generosity taking responsibility and waking before we die no matter what one's religion the reader will find such universal wisdom in this book that he will agree with frager's teacher muzaffer efendi who once advised you can tell these stories ten thousand times and people will still benefit from them
